

Newsletter Monday 30th March

Dear Parents

This is the first of what will be regular weekly newsletters during the period of closure. I will start by updating you on the child care service we offer for the children of key workers

The school was open every day last week for these children. I would like to thank all the staff for enabling this to happen even though we do have some who are self isolating or are otherwise unwell and unable to come into work. Eythorne Elvington was closed from Wednesday as at both schools we had less children requiring our service than first indicated. It therefore made sense to provide the childcare from just one school to share the staff more effectively.

Thank you to all parents who initially thought they would need our service but who have managed to keep their children at home. You have really helped us a great deal by reducing our numbers. We can provide a child care service for key workers but only if the families have no other option as it is important to minimise gatherings of people.

Thank you also to all teachers who have been responsibly and creatively leading the children's on-line home learning. I hope you have been able to access it without problems. Please remember that you can email your child's class teacher to clarify any problems and to receive support. I hope that you have enjoyed your first week as teachers!

During the Easter holiday, Thursday 2nd April until Wednesday 15th April, the school will not be open as we do not have the resources to enable this to happen. As far as we are aware, all parents who are key workers have managed to arrange their own child care.

In line with government guidelines we will re-open on Thursday 16th April and continue to provide the childcare service for the children of key workers of children from both schools being based at Sibertswold School as before. Towards the end of the Easter holidays we will contact these families to find out what they need.

Moving on to more general matters it has certainly been a strange week! I hope you are all well and have enjoyed the sunshine.....in your gardens of course!!!!

This week my son sent me a poem by Richard Hendrick about the current situation which I decided to share with you as it looks for positive aspects in this generally very unsettling time.
